Ashleigh Arundel, Secret Harbour Primary School

Year 2 teacher Ashleigh works closely with her co-workers to lift student results. Her encouraging and enthusiastic teaching incorporates literacy blocks, guided reading and problem solving. Ashleigh tailors her curriculum to meet the individual needs of students. She uses technology to provide engaging and relevant learning opportunities and has developed effective behaviour management practices based on school and Department of Education policies.

Sharon Attree, Newton Moore Senior High School

Sharon's professionalism as a Senior School Engagement Program teacher has created excellent outcomes for at-risk Aboriginal students. She has implemented a program that focuses on the skills, interests and commitments of these students, to give them a greater opportunity of achieving a WA Certificate of Education. The program has seen a significant number of students enter into Aboriginal School-Based Traineeships or Vocational Education and Training.

Eloise Crombie, Millen Primary School

Year 3 teacher Eloise is praised for her work ethic, enthusiasm and energy, and her students benefit from a curriculum catered to their range of abilities. Eloise was a high-achieving graduate from the Priority Placement Program and has volunteered for a range of professional development to improve her students' learning. Eloise's Society and Environment classes are based on the wide-ranging countries of origin of her students.

Lauren Horne, Beeliar Primary School

Lauren is a year 4 and 5 teacher who studies how the personalities and background of her students shape their learning. She then works closely with students, parents and other teachers to implement learning plans that meets their needs. Lauren connects with past and present pupils as a supervisor for Active After School Care and is a dedicated user of Department of Education resources as well as information and communications technology.

Nakita Kitson, WA College of Agriculture - Cunderdin

Nakita is an English teacher with a gift for helping students overcome literacy challenges. She has established small literacy groups within her classes and works voluntarily during the students' preparation time to improve their confidence and educational results. Nakita has revised and updated the school's English programs and is working towards a Graduate Diploma in Writing, whose benefits she will pass on to students.

Paula Moses, Waggrakine Primary School

Paula leads her students in implementing Waggrakine's 21st Century Learning program, which is central to the school's participation in the Microsoft Innovative Schools project. Her students participate in sustainability initiatives such as DeforestAction and Fair Trade Chocolate, in addition to their core curriculum. She is dedicated to understanding the needs of her class and once attended a Dyslexia SPELD Foundation workshop after a student was diagnosed with the condition. Leanne is an active member of the school's literacy committee and improves student results by setting targets and analysing progress against national data.

Scott Sullivan, Tom Price Primary School

Scott is a specialist Health and Physical Education teacher who has helped raise his students' attendance levels and engagement with learning. As well as physical education, he has improved results in science, information and communications technology (ICT), health and the arts. Scott promotes his students' interests by contributing greatly to staff meetings, school development days and committees on ICT and health and wellbeing.
